ReCharged in Prayer

ReCharge Conference is over and behind us. However, the impact and inspiration from this wonderful time where our souls (spiritual, physical, emotional, intellectual, and relational) were ministered to through worship, God's Word, fellowship, laughter, and just having some fun. We prayed over one another, for one another, and with one another. Our keynote speaker, Bill Elliff, reminded us that the most powerful person in any room is the one who is praying. Bill stated, "The man who prays brings God into the equation.

His challenge was to make a major adjustment in our daily prayer practices simply beginning by praying more right now. The greatest classroom for learning how to pray is on our knees praying. First Thessalonians 5:17 tells us to pray without ceasing. That means we can pray without an intermission. Bill stated, "God knows that your life will not work



if you are not talking to Him." Pastor, we are in the midst of a battle for the souls of our churches and the devil's number one priority is to stop the Lord's church from moving forward and advancing His kingdom. Honestly, have you ever known anyone who said that they prayed too much?

Unfortunately, we talk about prayer, we say we believe in prayer, we challenge people to pray, but do we pray? God has called us to live a supernatural life that requires His supernatural presence. He has called us to a supernatural work that requires supernatural power, the Holy Spirit. This requires prayer and praying without ceasing for a divine invasion of God's presence in your life and in your church. Are you willing to submit to this constant, ruthless evaluation of your life and your church: Is God present? First Thessalonians 5:17 is an imperative command and reminds us of how much God desires and wants our prayers.

It is easy to focus so much on what to pray that we forget to focus on how to enter His presence in order to pray. Bill did a wonderful job of showing us out of Matthew 6 (see his book *Simply Prayer*) how to enter in, because prayer is such an unnatural lane for us. The best classroom for prayer is praying and before Jesus tells us what to say He shows us the essential, preparatory elements.

First, enter in with sincerity. In Matthew 6:5 Jesus makes it very clear that pride must not be in our hearts. Bill states, "He (God) actively stands in opposition to



At this point after the ordeal of the long night, there must be pause - pause to remember the Great Physician who brought all this healing and miracle to pass.



A dear friend's mother was hospitalized that morning after a severe stroke. With a detour by the hospital, we headed for the coast. With time to spare, we decided to eat before boarding the ship.

With M going to the restroom before we left the restaurant, we were all prepared to leave. Have you ever had your plans interrupted by a mentally unstable person saying that one of you had stolen the tip money from her table? It happened. Talk about embarrassing! With everyone watching, we had to explain that the accusation was not true. Because there's seldom a way to prove quickly that a lie is a lie, it helped that the lady was obviously unhinged. But the story didn't end. She started following us as we left the restaurant.

With a security guard escorting us to our car, we decided that obviously we had missed God's direction to stay home that day. The trip to Ship Island certainly got away from us, and we left it unfinished.

But the sisters had their own trips that went awry, from east to west and north to south. They almost happened, but they didn't.

The one that I remember most vividly was a planned trip to Arizona for the Southwest Gospel Music Festival in Phoenix. We were excited because of all the southern gospel groups we would hear and because of a side trip to Tombstone (one of our favorite destinations) one more time. With Middle Sister not feeling well, we left Natchez to pick up Sister No. 1 in Houston.



80 allows you to make good time, but I've got to admit I kept it on 80 for all of 5 seconds. We could have killed Middle Sister for that wasted trip with few results except laughter. The highlight of the trip on our way back to Houston was a stop at Walmart to buy cooler clothes, a necessity because it was easier than unpacking the car. I may still have the shirt I bought in my closet.

Another trip on our bucket list was to Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, for Singing in the Sun. Six days of gospel music sounded heavenly to all of us. This time, I got sick; and we didn't even make it out of Hattiesburg. That trip is still on my bucket list!

The other memorable trips that didn't happen were cruises that Sister No. 1 and I planned and had reservations. One trip was a gospel cruise to the Caribbean, I think. We learned that insurance is a necessity for cruises because ill-

those who approach Him in arrogance.'

Second, we must enter in seclusion (Matthew 6:6). Our sole desire must be to commune with Him, and that requires a singular focus on Him whether you are in your prayer closet or a crowded sanctuary. Every time you pray you should imagine stepping into God's throne room. Your total focus is on Him just like the prophet's was in Isaiah 6:1-5. Bill states, "As you enter, the greatest one is before you and He's the only audience you need. As you enter, God is waiting for you on His throne and longing to reward you in His presence." Approach His presence with sincerity and the seclusion of a singular focus on Him.

Third, enter with simplicity (Matthew 6:7). Rosalind Rinker de-fines prayer as, "... the expression of the human heart in conversation with God. The more natural the prayer, the more real He becomes. Simply put: Prayer is a conversation between two persons who love

each other." Bill describes a very ordinary, normal exchange where you are aware of each other and take turns talking and listening. Your conversation stays on subject as you give full attention to the topic at hand. God is certainly concerned and attentive to what you have to say as you strive to pause in His presence and listen to Him as well

Fourth, enter in with simple faith (Matthew 6:8). Bill states, "As you enter, God hears you and you don't have to impress Him. Pray in faith, for God already knows your needs and has perfect provisions prepared." In faith we should pray the conditional promises of God, and there are many. Don't allow the things that God was willing to change go unchanged because you refused to meet Him in a private place and ask. There are things that God plans to do through no other means but prayer. James 4:2 makes it clear, "You do not have because you do not ask." Ask in faith believing that He is able.

You enter His presence through sincerity, seclusion, simplicity, simple faith, and as sons and daughters (Matthew 6:9). We are instructed to pray, "Our Father which art in heaven." He is our provider, protector, and promise keeper. You enter into His presence because of relationship, then His presence because of His rule: "Your kingdom come, your will be done.' As His child you gladly submit to His rule in your life and allow His standards to govern your life. Entering His presence is all about relational communication with Him and intimacy, not a long-distance, occasional interaction.

Colossians 4:2 says that we are to be devoted to prayer. That means to be ceaselessly active and to be courageously persistent. Remember, God believes that we need to pray with no intermission. First Thessalonians calls us to pray without ceasing. The challenge is to never stop praying, but to be continually in fellowship and communication with Him. Praying should become as natural to our spiritual lives as breathing is to our physical lives. Maybe your next step should be to order Bill's book, Simply Prayer, and begin the journey of more prayer to the God of the universe and His Son who loves you unconditionally.

Chaplain Guthrie Awarded "The Order of Martin of Tours" Medal

Chaplain (Colonel) Kevin Guthrie, a BMA Chaplain and 2003 graduate of the BMA Seminary, was recently awarded "The Order of Martin of Tours" medal, a prestigious U.S. Army Chaplain Corps regimental award during the 2022 Religious Leader Symposium in Southbridge, Massachusetts. Chaplain Guthrie was awarded for "Demonstrating the highest standards of integrity and moral character, displayed an outstanding degree of professional competence, selflessly served soldiers and families, and contributed to the promotion of the Army Chaplaincy."

"I've learned from my service in the Army, that the success of individuals is due to the many team members who support them.", stated Chaplain Guthrie. "I've been incredibly blessed through the years to have served on so many great teams that were singularly focused on the mission as well as taking care of their people, along with the great support of Chaplain Assistants who serve with absolute commitment to the Army. It has been my honor to be able to influence the shaping of the Army to become more receptive to religious freedoms and religious expression among our military service members.'

Chaplain Guthrie went on to say, "Chaplains represent two professions, the profession of arms as a military officer and the profession of the clergy. While chaplains minister to the chapel congregants, they also minister to people at their job sites, whether on post or on a patrol in combat. The responsibility of advisement to our commanders regarding religious matters, is part of our professional duties, as well as the mentorship of many young chaplains. Lastly, our acumen is tested daily as we navigate the bureaucracy of the largest employer in the world."

Chaplain Guthrie is scheduled to retire from active duty on November 1, 2023 after serving over 36 years in the Army, with the last 20 years as a military chaplain representing the Baptist Missionary Association of America. Guthrie noted, "A chaplain's primary job is to nurture the living, care for the wounded, and honor the fallen. Our day-to-day jobs insert us directly into the lives of soldiers and army civilians who are giving everything they have to ensure the United States stays protected from our enemies." He continued, "As chaplains, we are honored and privileged to be able to serve the best our nation has to honor...our soldiers and their families. We meet people where they live and work, when they are at their best or at their worst during life's most important events.'

Chaplain Guthrie is now assigned to the United States Army Materiel Command as the Command Chaplain. The Army Ma-Command consists teriel of 190,000 soldiers and army civilians who ensure materiel readiness for a globally dominant land force. The Army Materiel Command oversees 10 major subordinate commands across the global Army footprint, including city management-like services of 73 Army garrisons, contracting services for the Army, financial management for the Army, foreign military sales, supply for all soldiers, aviation and missile maintenance and resupply, electronics and communication across the U.S. Armed Forces, bomb and ammunition production and storage for all U.S. Armed Forces, global distribution service over land and by sea implementing more ships than the Navy, and production and maintenance of ground combat systems for the U.S. Army.

The Order of Martin of Tours medal that Chaplain Guthrie was recently awarded, is titled in honor of a soldier's religious experience. Martin of Tours was the Roman soldier who served in the fourth century and was stationed in Gaul, now modern day France. One winter, he encountered a beggar outside of the city gates and although Martin did not have coins to give him, he cut his wool cape in half and gave it to the beggar. That night in a dream, Jesus, wrapped in the same cloak, appeared to Martin.

Today, the remaining half of Martin's cape is enshrined for protection in memory of that selfless act. In Latin, the word for cape is 'capella' and from it is where the military chaplain derives their title and where we also get the word for our military chapels.

God's grace is amazing. His saving grace that gives eternal life to all who believe is beyond compare. His common grace and patience given to all of creation that keeps His wrath from devouring all the sinfulness in the world in an instant is taken for granted far too often. Sanctifying grace like we see in 2 Peter 3:18, is given with the command to grow. This sanctifying grace may not get the praise of saving grace, but its beauty is in the fact that it is not just something we receive but now believers are partaking in this work of grace.

In 2 Samuel chapter nine a peculiar story unfolds. While not odd in some senses, in its historical context Old Testament humanity would have thought this very strange and would have continued to think so for many generations. At the end of 1 Samuel and beginning of 2 Samuel we have the death of Saul. This divides Israel for a time with David being anointed King of Judah and Abner anointing Ishbosheth king of Israel. After many conflicts the kingdom was restored under David. Then in 2 Samuel 9, "And David said, Is there yet any that is left of the house of Saul, that I may show him kindness for Jonathan's sake?" This is the picture of that sanctifying grace. It is the picture of showing kindness to other on someone else's behalf. David receives his answer, "And there was of the house of Saul a

servant whose name was Ziba. And when they had called him unto David, the king said unto him, Art thou Ziba? And he said, Thy servant is he. And the king said, Is there not yet any of the house of Saul, that I may shew the kindness of God unto him? And Ziba said unto the king, Jonathan hath yet a son, which is lame on his feet. And the king said unto him, Where is he? And Ziba said unto the king, Behold, he is in the house of Machir, the son of Ammiel, in Lo-debar. Then king David sent, and fetched him out of the house of Machir, the son of Ammiel, from Lo-debar." After the answer David pursues the object of his kindness, "Now when Mephibosheth, the son of Jonathan, the son of Saul, was come unto David, he fell on his face, and did reverence. And David said, Mephibosheth. And he answered, Behold thy servant! And David said unto him, Fear not: for I will surely shew thee kindness for Jonathan thy father's sake, and will restore thee all the land of Saul thy father; and thou shalt eat bread at my table continually." Pursuit is not the end of the story, David follows through kindness he had with the "So Mephibosheth promised,

dwelt in Jerusalem: for he did eat continually at the king's table; and was lame on both his feet."

We are thankful to report a new addition to the home as of January ninth. Bethany is a sweet soul who is learning to blend in with our house of boys. We are still learning her many interests, but she has a very fun loving personality. I have been meditating on this story from Second Samuel since her arrival and how it pertains to our ministry at the home and how it pertains to Christian sanctification.

The oddity of the story of David and Mephibosheth is that it is the opposite of how most kings in those days would have handled things. When a King has already had to battle for his throne and he has had to deal with another king trying to claim that power for himself, most would eliminate the entire family to remove any future rebellion. Instead of eliminating Mephibosheth, David welcomes him to the king's table continually. Society surely thought David's actions were odd, and his value of Mephibosheth was vastly skewed from the rest of the world. What value does a maimed grandson of an adversary hold? No one saw value in Mephibosheth but the one who desired to show kindness.

Many of our children here at the home are not valued the same way as everyone else. This passage has encouraged me to see the heart of God through David and how we can partake in sanctifying grace to continue showing that heart in the world <u>today</u>. We show kindness to those who the world would not value and on the behalf of another give them a place at our table continually. There is no greater picture of the grace God gives through his son Jesus Christ.

Please pray for Bethany. She has many hurdles that are beyond her control and power to overcome. Thankfully we know there is a God who offers grace to overcome this world. Pray for us that we would show her the grace and love of Christ that would encourage, strengthen, and most importantly save her soul. This grace will give her more than a place at our physical table - it will give her a place at His eternal table. We would love to come and share with your church this wonderful ministry God has given us.



he mission of Christ is the focal point of the New Testament. It is interesting to watch as a group of unknown tax collectors and fishermen "turn the world upside down" in obedience to the mission of Christ. The book of Acts covers thirty-three years, and in that timeframe the gospel advanced from Jerusalem to Rome, Paul and his missionary teams started over twenty churches, and those churches started other churches. Almost every New Testament epistle is a letter back to a brand new church or to someone who was leading a brand new church. Hence, the opening line of this paragraph would be better stated as follows: The mission of Christ, in and through the church, is the focal point of the New Testament.

Mission: To fulfill God's mission by sending and partnering to share God's story, make disciple makers, and start churches that multiply among the nations.

The word commission has a few synonyms such as assignment, duty, responsibility, mandate, etc. Before we analyze the meaning of being CO:MISSIONED, perhaps the first step is to come to grips with the fact that, as followers of Christ, we have been "missioned." A God of mission could only produce and expect a people of mission. We have a God-given mission!

Looking in the familiar passage that we refer to as the Great Commission in Matthew 28:18-20, we gain more insight to the importance of being CO:MISSIONED with emphasis on the fact that this commission is not of our origins, desires, or abilities. It is indeed a CO:MISSION with the colon communicating that this is from another and not our own invention.

Vision: To see every partner church around the world engaged in the process of starting a church.

In verse 18, Christ affirms that "all authority" has been given to him in heaven and on earth. The eternal God/resurrected Savior has inherent (it belongs to him by nature) authority because he is God. In verse 19, he then commands us to go and make disciples of all nations, and our authority is inherited from Christ–it is not our own. What a great encouragement! We are CO:MISSIONED and our authority is from the God who has ALL authority.

Another aspect of our CO:MISSION is that we have been commanded to make disciples of all peoples by Christ himself. Christ came in fulfillment of a mission; we go in fulfillment of a mission. The last truth about our CO:MISSION is that we go with Christ. He is always with us, and we do not advance in our own power, but in his.

CO:MISSIONED is indeed to be "missioned" but not by ourselves. We are on a continuing journey with Christ to fulfill his mission. We do that with his authority (from), according to his mandate (by), and through his power (with).

The BMA worldwide family now includes close to 2,000 churches. BMA Global Missions has planted almost 800 churches and is currently planting 450 more! We are church planters! We do believe that "the mission of Christ, in and through the church, is the focal point of the New Testament."

We are excited about 2023 to see more of the synergistic effect continue in worldwide church planting. Many faithful servants have sown and cultivated over many years in dozens of countries and now God is giving the increase through the multiplication of disciples and churches.

BMA Global Missions mobilizes churches and people to the mission field (send), helps plant churches that plant churches (start), and provides care and support for healthy leaders and churches (support). We are so grateful for the opportunity to partner with your church. Please continue to be faithful as you renew and refresh your church's commitment to the basics of our CO:MISSION: pray, give, send, and go.

Please pray as BMA Global Missions reaches for new goals in 2023 and beyond. Some of these goals include a significant increase in the number of missionaries we send from our churches over the next ten years, specifically targeting urban areas of the United States for multiple church plants, increasing the number of language groups with church plants from seven to fifteen inside the United States, and assisting churches around the world to achieve maturity and multiplication.

Thank you all again for being faithful in our God-given CO:MISSION that is fulfilled from, by, and with the Lord Jesus Christ.

CO:MISSIONED IN LATIN AMERICA-CONTINUING THE LEGACY

he churches and missions of Central America and the Caribbean face unique challenges as they labor to be effective in their evangelistic efforts, church planting, and discipleship of new believers. The region is known for its extreme weather, repressive governments, and poverty level. The BMAA has had a missions presence in this area for an entire generation, but in almost every country American missionaries have handed off leadership responsibilities to national pastors and leaders. As a result, each country has developed its own personalized method to conduct missions efforts in partnership with our association of churches in the United States.

In Nicaragua, churches and missions are prospering in cities and towns scattered around the country, but there is also a renewed effort to reach the more isolated areas of the Atlantic side of the country. Traveling on horseback or in boats down the jungle rivers, people are sharing the gospel and planting new works. Leadership training and Bible instruction is regularly conducted even in the most isolated areas of the country. A recent hurricane dealt a serious blow to the economy, especially on the Atlantic side of the country where crops and homes were devastated. But these strong folks are recovering and forging ahead with efforts to share the Word even in difficult circumstances.

The tiny country of El Salvador is considered one of the most violent countries in Latin America with street gangs holding enormous sway over everyday life and even local government. In spite of that, with strong local leadership, new missions are being planted and established churches are growing. BMAA medical missions has been a positive influence here, as has the shoebox ministry.

The churches and missions among the Garifuna populations in Honduras continue to reach out to other communities of their ethnic group, and a Garifuna language mission was recently established in the Bronx, New York.

In Guatemala, our churches that are concentrated in the capital area are expanding their facilities to accommodate growing congregations.

Costa Rica continues with a well-developed plan to train and send out new missionaries around the country.

In the Caribbean, Puerto Rico is still recovering from yet another hurricane but recently ordained a missionary/pastor and continues to plant new missions on the island. In each of these countries, the absence of an American missionary has not slowed efforts to fulfill the Great Commission. While it is true that American missionaries have had a significant impact on those efforts-in many cases by pioneering the first works in the country-national leaders have successfully stepped into leadership roles and assumed responsibilities previously held by American missionaries. And since the primary goal of crosscultural missionaries is to "work yourself out of a job," it all adds up to a missions success story!

The role of BMAA Missions has rapidly evolved over the last several years in this region. In the absence of American missionaries, national leaders have accepted the challenge to take ownership of their own missionary vision for their countries. As that vision is clarified, the BMAA has stepped in to encourage and facilitate the realization of each country's particular vision. We have participated in joint efforts to fund missionaries from their countries that are sent out both locally and internationally. Medical teams have made visits to several areas to address health needs of the least fortunate and raise the profile of our local churches. Periodically, training sessions and Bible classes are conducted throughout the region. Through Lifeword the gospel is being preached in difficult-to-reach areas.

American missionaries are no longer "in charge" in Central America and the Caribbean, but as an association of churches we are providing resources to the men who are "leading the charge" in their respective countries. Many serve in areas where they walk a virtual tightrope to avoid being targeted by the government or violent gangs. All work with extremely limited budgets. They all have asked for our prayers. We should honor that request.





CO:MISSIONED in Europe-Harvesting the White but Difficult Fields

hat develops culturally, even spiritually, in Europe eventually makes its way to North America. In the United States nearly half of adults (48%) describe themselves as both religious and spiritual. That number has grown at an alarming rate from 19% to 27% of those who now say they are spiritual but not religious. Comparing that to Western Europe, 53% of adults say they are neither religious nor spiritual, and that philosophy is growing and spreading at an unprecedented speed.

Yes, the opportunities are plentiful, but the soil is very hard and requires a lot of cultivating because of the post-Christian culture that permeates. One country is the poster child for this sad lack of spirituality: Czech Republic, where missionaries Larry and Tammy Wood work alongside our ChangeMaker Milan Bulak. Almost 90% of Czechs aged 16-29 say they have no religion. Over 70% of the same age group say they never pray and only attend services on very special occasions.

Pray for Czech Republic.

Missions in France (Sean and Kendall Pasley) is very similar, and the reality of living in a secular culture is evident everywhere they look. Because the church has existed on European soil for 2,000 years, we might assume all is well, but the exact opposite is true. The terms that fit France and much of Western Europe are post-Christian culture, post-Christian society, post-Christian ethics, and post-Christian values. This is why our missionaries and ChangeMakers are so important to spread the gospel.

Pray for France.

Portugal's percentages are not as bad as France's or Czech Republic's, but in talking with ChangeMaker Marco Gaspar and other pastors, it is a difficult field where most men feel that going to church is not manly and is for women and children only. The churches there are small but determined to remain faithful to sound doctrine and to their calling no matter how difficult it might become. We recently held a leaders' retreat in Portugal focused on encouragement, and God moved mightily.

Pray for Portugal.

God is moving in both Western and Eastern European countries through the efforts of Larry and Tammy Wood and our ChangeMakers. Please pray for the people there. We hear reports that even though there are severe hardships, they remain resolved and encouraged that the Lord will be with them no matter what happens. We talk about persecution here, but in our much easier lives we really do not understand nor can we relate to the hardships of those living in a war zone.

Pray for Ukraine.

Portugal, France, Czech Republic, Ukraine, and Romania comprise my region. Romania has a very dear place in my heart, after having lived there in 2000 and 2001. With the exception of the COVID year, we have been making trips there since 1997. Our ChangeMakers are Dani Bagosi and Bogdan Bilav. We have American missionaries, Bryan and Pam Risner and Cristian and Vanessa Martinez (He grew up in Mexico and she is Romanian). We also have two single ladies working in-country: Candra Barnett with the Risners and Sara Filimon (Vanessa Martinez's sister) working with the Martinezes.

Romania's population is decreasing. A country of 22 million not too long ago, it has decreased to 18 million. In a 98% Orthodox nation the Romanian Baptist Union recently reported that in the last ten years the number of Baptists has decreased from 120,000 members to 90,000. Obviously, Baptists are losing ground in their ability to effectively reach Romania with the gospel. Western Europe is challenged with secularism while Eastern Europeans (Ukraine and Romania) believe they do not need the gospel because they are "Christian" nations. However, their religion is works-based, very ritualistic, and ceremonial.

Pray for Romania.

Yes, the fields are white unto harvest, but they are difficult because people believe, from different perspectives, that they are okay and do not need to change. Pray for our workers there that God will raise up laborers (Luke 10:2), provide their needs (Phil. 4:19), open doors of opportunity (Col. 4:3), and produce fruit that will remain (John 15). Please commit to praying for them and their families that they will remain encouraged and focused on the task God has called them to and placed before them.

The addition of 15 new languages will not only increase the number of languages in which we share the gospel, but it will exponentially increase the number of people who can hear and spread the gospel.

Programming

Creating new programming that taps into the interest and draws those who do not know God or are far away from God will be one of Lifeword's top goals for 2023. We will use our expanded television production studios to produce more internet shows to speak the heart language of the viewer. We will use our new podcasting studios to produce new and exciting podcast formats. The goal for every Lifeword production is to take the viewer or listener to the cross of Christ. Using media to cast a wide net through interesting and experiential programming will allow us to speak into different cultures and share with them the Good News of Jesus.

Discipleship

Lifeword will use 2023 to refine and test our new discipleship portal called "Follow." This exciting project invites and equips those who engage with Lifeword programming to become fully-devoted followers of Christ and to connect with a local church. We will also refine our digital discipleship process so BMA church members can use "Follow" as a personal discipleship tool.

Print

Lifeword will continue to expand our efforts to introduce and challenge readers through blog content. We will seek out gifted writers who are faithful to God's Word and compelling in their writing style. Our goal will continue to be to use digital media to ask pertinent life questions and offer answers through the truth of God's Word.

Financial

The best estimates from missiologists are that nearly 3 billion people on earth have never heard the Good News of Jesus Christ.
